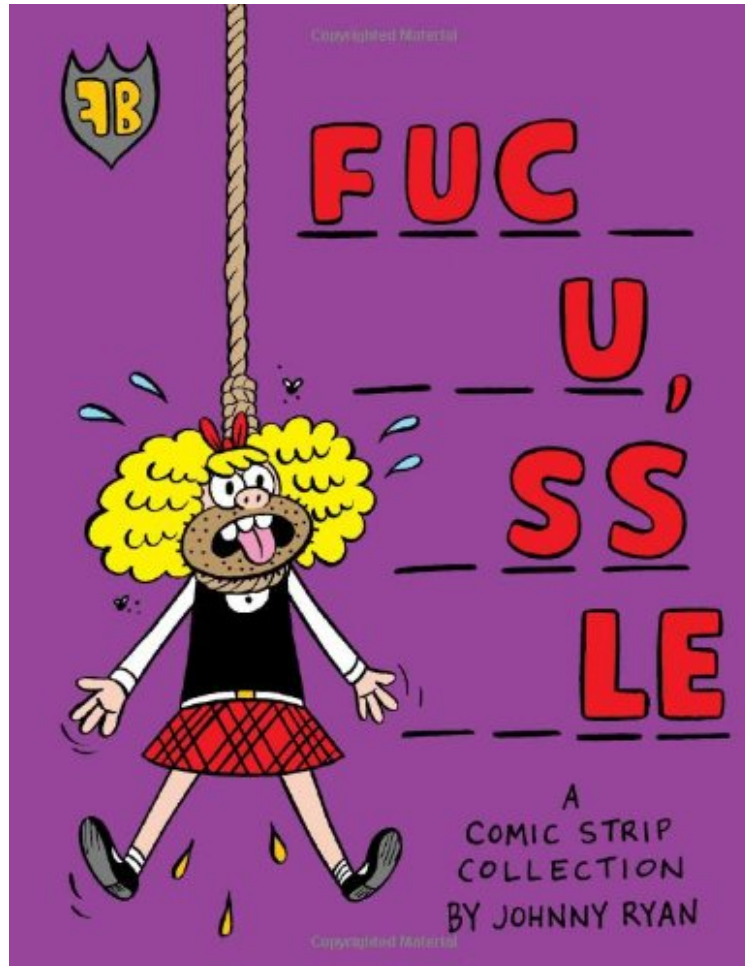

Ryan is in top form with his latest collection of Blecky Yuckerella strips, where every page brings a new round of vulgar, revolting, and offensive humor. Fans will welcome this installment of his no-holds-barred attack on polite sensibilities, while those who don't know his work will either embrace it or throw the book to the ground and run. Either way, Ryan's profane point of view, which entered the comics world with Angry Youth Comix in the mid-'90s, makes an impression. The line of bad boys in independent comics stretches back from Tony Millionaire (Maakies), Peter Bagge (hate), and Rick Altergott (Doofus) to sixties undergrounders S. Clay Wilson and, heck, R. Crumb himself. Ryan may be the most upsetting of them all, certainly in his Angry Youth Comix, which brings its mixture of scatology, sex, and billingsgate to an acme of noxious hilarity or, for some, nausea. The four-panel Blecky Yuckerella strips are as gross but, with kid protagonists, not as sexual or foul-mouthed. The body and its, uh, products constitute the primary font of all humor here, even in the relatively tranquil, subtle, downtime strip, "The Graveyard of Hilarious Cliches," for the last of those moribund apothegms is "Clean-up on aisle three!" Occasionally, garden-variety perverseness generates a punch line, as when Blecky, a Shirley Temple-like little girl--with whiskers and trailing flies!--explains that the sight of "a pathetic loser having a really crappy life" compels her to "make his life even crappier!" The strip's humor usually has to do more with crap than with perverseness. Ray Olson
