Good follow-up to Hunter-Killer Vol. 1By Davia D.I would classify Cyberforce/Hunter-Killer vol. 1 as more of a Hunter Killer book than a Cyberforce one. The Cyberforce characters play a lot of role in the plot and get plenty of time, but the H/K side benefits greatly by having a human face on it's villain, while Cyberdata remains much more faceless, for

all the role it plays in the story. Stylistically, it's closer to HK vol 1 than the Cyberforce title too, but it blends the Ultra-sapient plot and Cyberforce's cyborgs together well. The Cyberforce characters get more characterization, but in large part because they have more than the HK team (Ellis and Argent and Morningstar excepted), and I did like how Architect from HK got a lot more development than in the previous volume, considering how interesting his power is. As for the plot itself! Ellis of HK tries to bring together the Hunter-Killer team together with Cyberforce, while Cyberdata and other interested parties try and make them kill each other in order to try and prevent him from bringing them together to oppose a serious plot of theirs he's gotten wind of, all without Ellis asking Morningstar, HK's leader, for permission, for a starter. Even with Ellis trying to prevent the clash between the teams, things don't go quite as well as he'd hoped and there's casualties right off the bat. Stakes are high and characters from both sides play major roles. Meanwhile, the art is fantastic. It's a well done story that uses both teams and their respective opponents well. I'd give it a 4.5 if I could, but barring that it's still a very solid 4 stars. 3 of 3 people found the following review helpful.

This details the original combining of these two rather deadly groups as they battle Cyberdata, an organization that specializes in creating superhuman fighters. With a complex cast of characters, the title has the feel of a more traditional comic with superheroes you've probably seen before in other titles. As I mentioned earlier, Velocity is an ever-present part of Cyberforce along with many other members. In a time when so much of Top Cows stuff is pretty original and different, it's nice to see this comic as more of a throwback to some of the stuff you'd see in the 90s. We have traditional heroes with varying powers working together to combine in interesting ways. The difference is these were granted by an evil corporate technical entity rather than through random genetic mutation. The relationship between the two teams that has been established will be interesting to follow in the future. If you've ever been curious about the series or the goings on of either of these teams of soldiers then go pick it up in stores.
