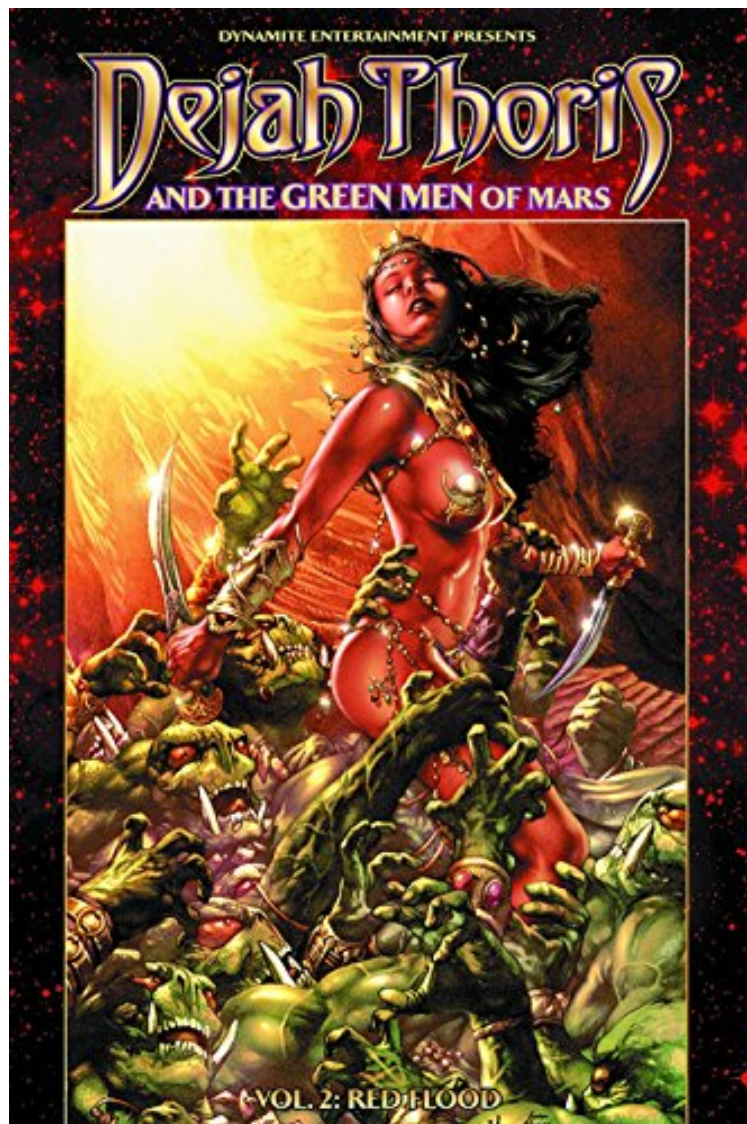

Great read for any long time fan and even readers who might be slightly disappointed with the previous issue. As always the illustrations are to die for, although the bosoms depicted seemed to have grown to ridiculous proportions. Please don't let her be derided as a fan service character by shallow critics and first time readers, specially when she has done so much in this volume that make her equally complex, deadly, and compelling as Walter White or Batman. Yes, the princess strikes back with all her fury and cunning. I have always maintained that Dejah Thoris is a strong female character and nothing proves me right more than this issue. Her journey is not in a cliched rage-fueled carnage that... somehow ends in her favor because ACT III demanded it. No, this is not Red Sonja nor Conan. Just because she has muscles and a dire need for satisfaction does not mean everything will turn out as she wished. The villains and the underpinning racism she tackles are constantly out of her reach and even her own people openly shows their ugly prejudices, enough so that as you read, you know there will not be an unrealistic sappy happy ending at the end. The princess is dealing with entrenched uncompromising hatred on both sides and we see her beautiful soul because she maintains her own committed vision of peace despite every difficult ugly challenge. Even those that are closest to her, those that have been previously lauded as heroes are shown as lesser, pettier beings eager for a quick, though unjust solution that might lead to generations of cyclical bloodshed. This is a uniquely Dejah Thoris struggle, more akin to what a Secretary of State has to deal with rather than swashbuckling hero. But she persisted, with responsibility, dignity, and cold efficiency that even makes the most savage of her foes horrified to their cores. I like this book because it eloquently showed a worthy hero struggling with a great burden of responsibility. We are also fortunate to see her handling her troubles with proactive ploys, stratagems, maneuverings, feints unique in her own ways. The pacing is succinct, not a single page is wasted, each death shown has impact (wonderful change since "White Apes,") no threat is left unaddressed, all introduced are used fully. Best yet, like a good episode of "Breaking Bad" or "Walking Dead" there will also be plenty of ruthlessly efficient gray solutions that comes back to the mind after reading. All and all, a mighty satisfying story. Thank you Mr Rahner. Thank you Mr. Antonio. I can't wait for your next book.
