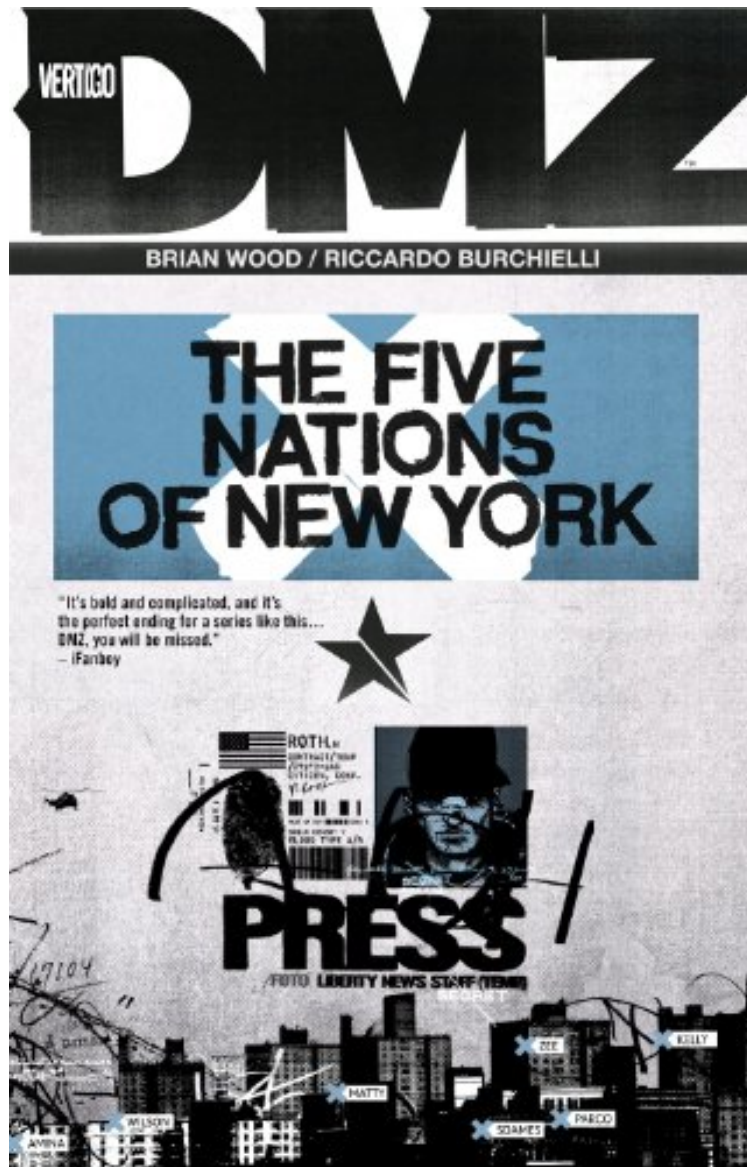

But since DMZ's emphasis has always been on the war's effects on the city's residents rather than the actual combat, this account of the conflict's aftermath and the fates of the participants, particularly that of journalist Matty Fox, is as compelling as any of the more eventful preceding volumes. Wood's command of his characters and Burchielli's darkly emotional drawings make this a satisfying conclusion to one of the most artistically rewarding recent mainstream comics. --Gordon Flagg
