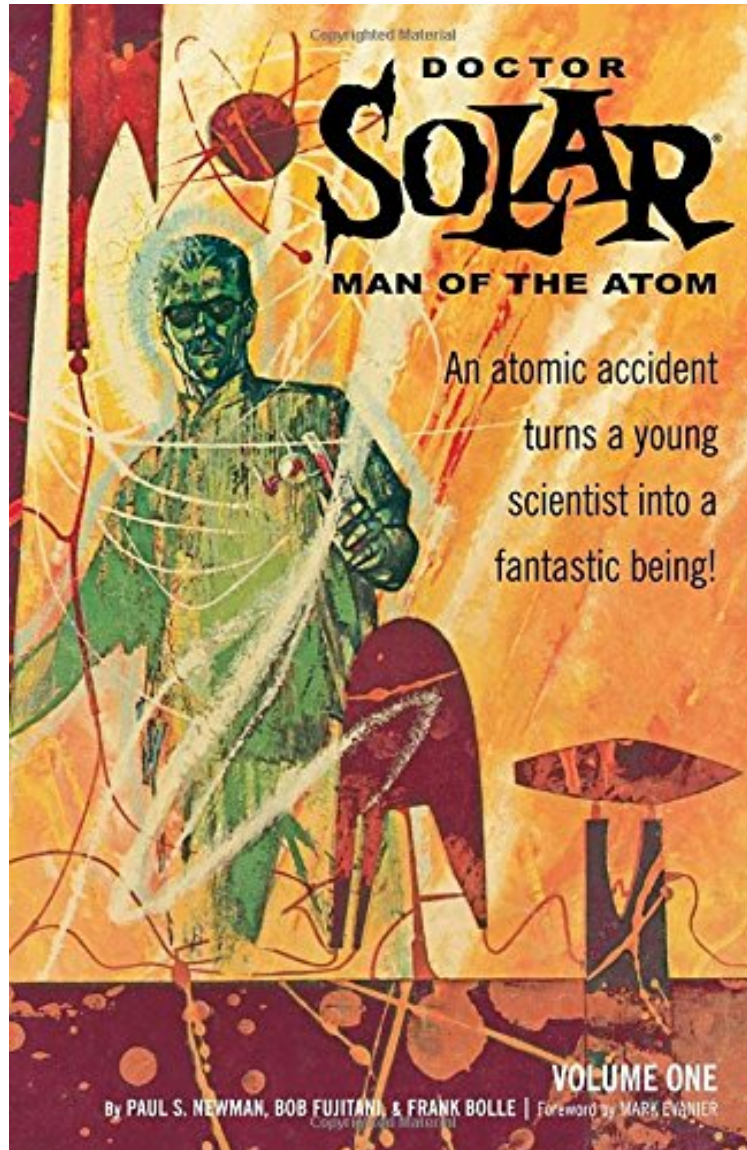

But several other publishers vied for every kids quarters, among them Dell - Western Publishing - Whitman. Most of this line consisted of TV and Movie spin-offs, but when they did original material like Dr. Solar, it was uniquely different from the DC or Marvel approach. There are well drawn, intelligent stories worth enjoying. There isn't the dynamism of King Kirby, nor the soap opera of Stan Lee, the breadth and depth of characters at DC, but if you've read all that, try some 1960s (not 1990s) Dr. Solar to cleanse the palate.0 of 0 people found the following review helpful.
