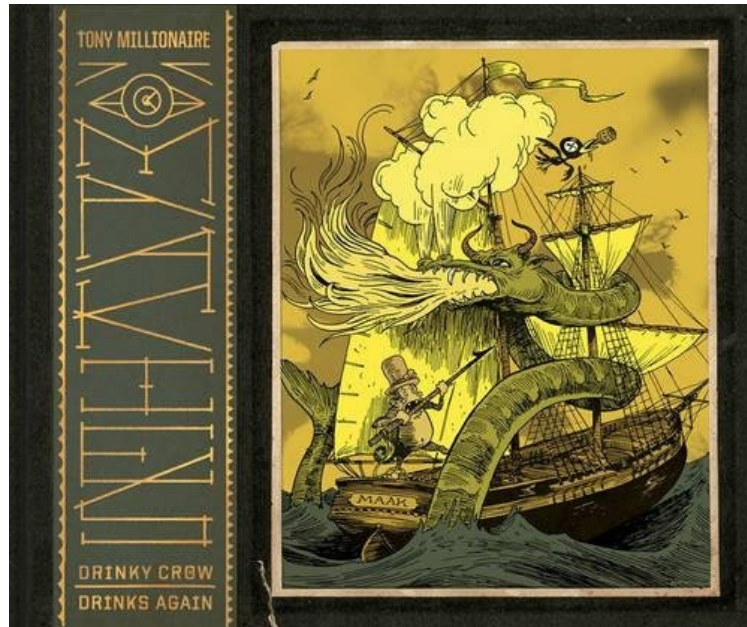

2 of 2 people found the following review helpful. The Virtuoso of Gross Humor By David Swan This is my sixth hardcover Maakies collection which I believe leaves me missing only two. I never picked up The House at Maakies Corner and When We Were Very Maakies because they have skyrocketed in price. All the previous Maakies books were a mere 4.8 inches in height and could fit only one strip per page while Drinky Crow Drinks Again is 8.8 inches and can accommodate two strips per page. Cool, huh? Well, 8.8 inches is not double of 4.8 inches. I measured the height of the strips in Green Eggs and Maakies and the height was 3 and 5/8th inch. The height in this book is just about 3 inches. This is not just some quibbling about 5/8th inch. It really makes a difference. The images in Green Eggs and Maakies look cleaner and the inking darker. The bigger problem is that Millionaire runs a tiny strip across the bottom of the main strip with a second joke and in some cases its almost illegible to me and I dont have this issue with the previous books. Reducing the size of the panels, particularly given the heavy inking by Millionaire, really doesnt help the picture quality. At least you get more material, right? Maybe. Green Eggs and Maakies was the slenderest Maakies book I owned at 119 pages. Drinky Crow Drinks Again is 127 pages but there are a lot of full page spreads some spanning both pages. Drinky Crows Maakies Treasure is a glorious 271 pages with well sized strips. As the old saying goes, if it aint broke dont fix it and although the Maakies books had somewhat rare dimensions they accommodated the size of the strips perfectly unlike this book. The latest book also doesnt fit nicely on the shelf with the other Maakies books. Its like the odd man out. When I saw the book I thought it might be some kind of best of compilation but as far as I can tell Fantagraphics simply chose to change the dimensions. So now that Ive gone on WAY too long about the dimensions of the book, is it good? Of course. Tony Millionaire is a genius. This is not humor for everyone and the grossness levels go right into the red. However, if all Millionaire had in his bag of tricks

was scatological humor he would never become this popular. Millionaire is the Michelangelo of vomit, flatulence and diarrhea humor. I can only think of a few areas where I've never seen Millionaire go (to his credit). As far as bodily functions go Millionaire pretty much explores them all. This is not a book you want to read while eating dinner. This is a book that might also require a trigger warning for alcoholics since that is about half of the humor.
