Even though deeply flawed, the story still is somewhat charming and I may give the series one more chance.This graphic novel collects the first four issues of the Image series and is 104 pages not counting the extra short story. Due to extreme violence and some implied sex scenes, I think this graphic novel is

Saga meets Prophet meets Justice League (Dark) By hollowman EGOs somehow managed to slip under my radar as monthly singles but when I saw the trade edition on the rack in my local comic shop it spoke to me, Open me. Browse the few pages. Buy me because you need me in your life. And it was true. Sometimes you just get lucky after picking a random book. EGOs or Earth Galactic Operatives (but ego also works on another level too-you'll have to read the book to find out) are a group of intergalactic superheroes who take on villains, solve problems etc. This book differs from similar ones in this style in that no one in EGOs is safe, they're falling apart at the seams and some of their powers are questionable. The main guys power is the ability to impress his thoughts inside his enemy's head. The newest incarnation/line-up of EGOs is dysfunctional, undertrained and simply put, not up to the task. Add trouble in paradise between two of the founding members in the mix and things are looking bleak. The writing is concise and linear but manages to stay creative and inventive. The bonus short story and the interview at the end of the book are a nice touch. I think that advice should have been heeded in this case, and it might have resulted in a book that was bit clearer. For a volume 1, it does sort of jump you into a story with a lot of backstory that has already happened. An old nemesis of the E.G.O. space hero team has resurfaced and it's up to some of the old members to suit up, recruit up and fight the planet devouring menace. The problem is that the story isn't all that easy to grab on to. There are some great elements here and the makings of a truly great story, but I was left feeling like I was missing part of the plot. The plot jumps and references things that I had a hard time discerning. The art by Gus Storms is really good, and I know Stuart Moore can write a good story. Your mileage may vary, but for sheer cosmic, weird storylines, I'd rather go back to some of the classics from Marvel in the 1970s.
