Since the next book has not even been announced, who can say for certain when (or if) it will be out.That being said it's a good ride.The world of 'Empire' is simple, the supervillains won. The heroes are dead, the world is their fascist state run by the

Emperor Golgotha. It begins with a great sequence, the world is observing a moment of silence in honor of the Emperor's daughter. A moment of silence enforced by summary executions! As the story unfolds however we see cracks appearing in Golgotha's perfect rule. His own court is asking questions about his ability to rule and you get the feeling one little push could bring it all down. Think Game of Thrones with supervillains. It's definitely a good set up, with some unusually subtle plot points for an American comic. Barry Kitson's art is always gorgeous, he's up there with Kevin Maguire in his ability to show emotions. There are some comic book touches that do detract from the more mature serious plot line. There's a sexy assassin who goes into battle in a mid-riff baring top and perfectly coiffed hair. There's a subplot about aliens that doesn't go anywhere this book. But by and large this is surprisingly mature book and a welcome return. This one follows up on the aftermath of that one, and just to make things clear, it shows you how really awful life in the Empire is compared to the freedoms we currently have. In this one Golgoth appears to not be handling the death of his daughter all that well. People are beginning to notice, lose faith in him, and various degrees of plots against him are beginning to form. Plus there's the aliens and one of his former ministers who are still out and about looking to cause problems. While the supervillian Golgoth is an intriguing character the rest of the supporting cast is less interesting. There has been no real character development or drive to tell the story. The good thing I can say is that Golgoth is pretty fascinating and the writers do a good job of keeping him that way.
