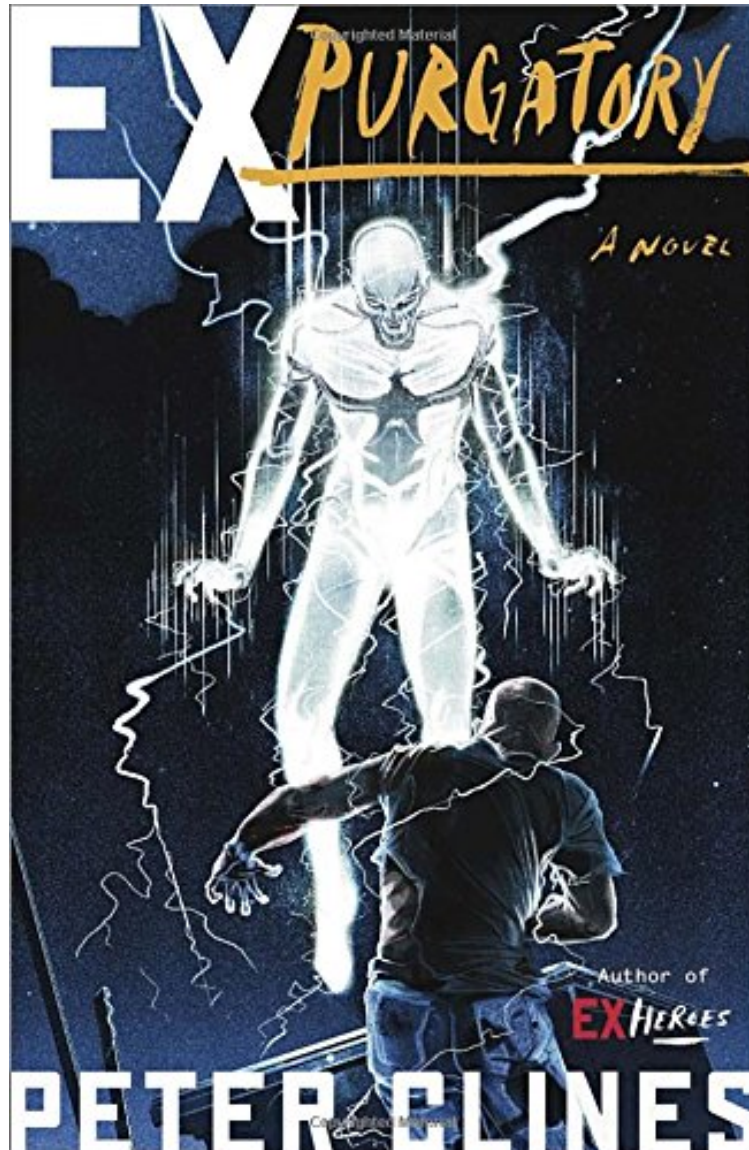

Ex Purgatory, Book 4 of the Peter Clines' brilliant Ex series is quite a bit different than his other installments. In this book, the reader follows St George, who inexplicably is now a janitor and unaware of who he is. There are constant reality shifts, the re-introduction of characters from the previous books, zombies and all kinds of confusion.

What St George and the other main characters are experiencing is ultimately revealed to the reader and explained rather believably through a pop culture reference. I liked the book and how the author is keeping the series interesting. The super heroes are much stronger than the zombies so any interactions with the undead at this point are pretty underwhelming. Reading passages of how the zombies are dispatched with such ease almost feels like we are just being told what is going on and feeling no sense of dread at all. Fortunately in this book, the zombies are not a focus and the heroes have their work cut out for them. The first book came out just as both the Zombies trend was hitting it big, and as super hero movies and stories were big -- combining them seemed over-the-top but was well done and really fun. The other books took the characters in good directions. While this book was still enjoyable, it was my least favorite. The "gimmick" part of the plot went on for too long and just plodded along. The first half of the book was buried in the slow plot gimmick, and the story didn't really get back to the kind of action I expected until about 2/3 through the book. This was also a variation on a plot earlier in the series. In a superhero book, I expect more action and super-heroics. This book could have been better. If the "gimmick" had lasted for maybe the first quarter, and then the story could have taken several different paths. It was nice to see a little bit of background on Stealth, but even that wasn't as clear as it could have been.
