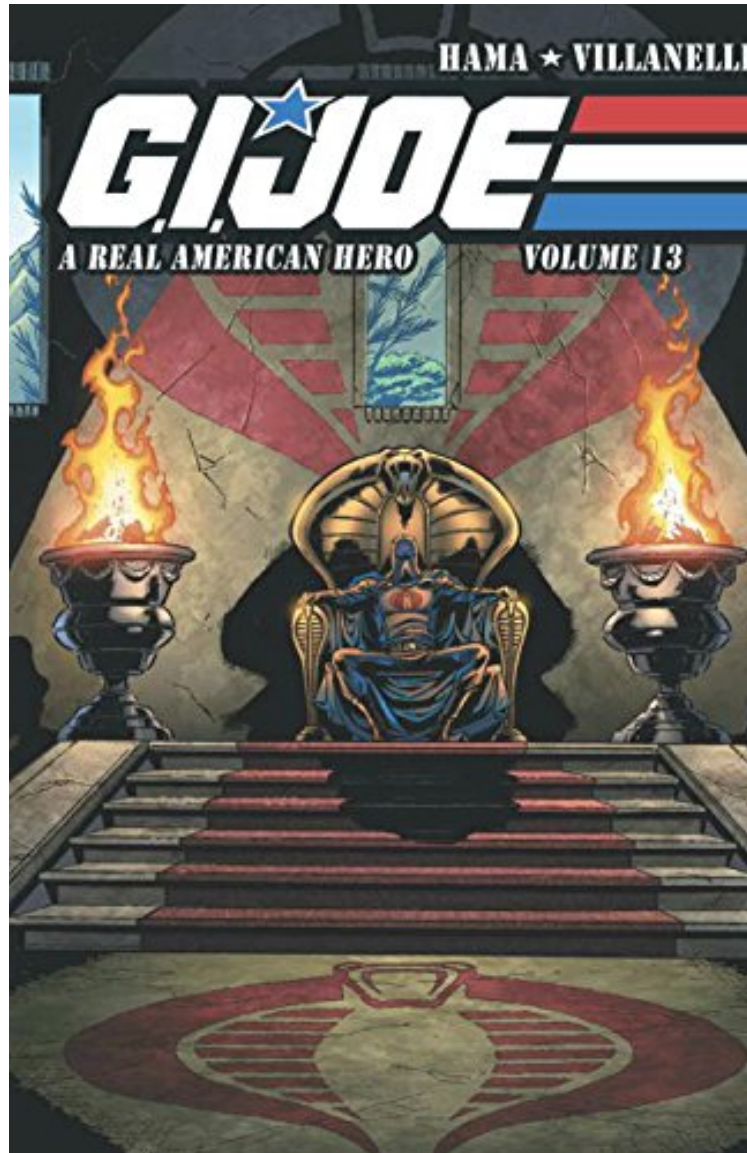

A year or two ago, IDW (the current publisher of the GI Joe comics) asked Larry Hama, the writer and part-time illustrator of the classic series, to come back and publish new stories set in the GI Joe universe of the classic

comics, as a result we got GI Joe a Real American Hero. This is the first volume of this new series, and it kicks it off pretty well. After reading this volume I am going to be collecting them all as they come out. In my opinion, GI Joe A Real American Hero, is the perfect blend of classic 1980's comic book writing and modern art. It is great to see a modern comic book story with all the classic Joes just the way I remember them when I was a kid. I introduced my 11 year old son, to both the classic series, and this relaunch, and he likes the relaunch better. I think this new series does a great job of introducing GI Joe to a new generation, without compromising the integrity of these characters.
