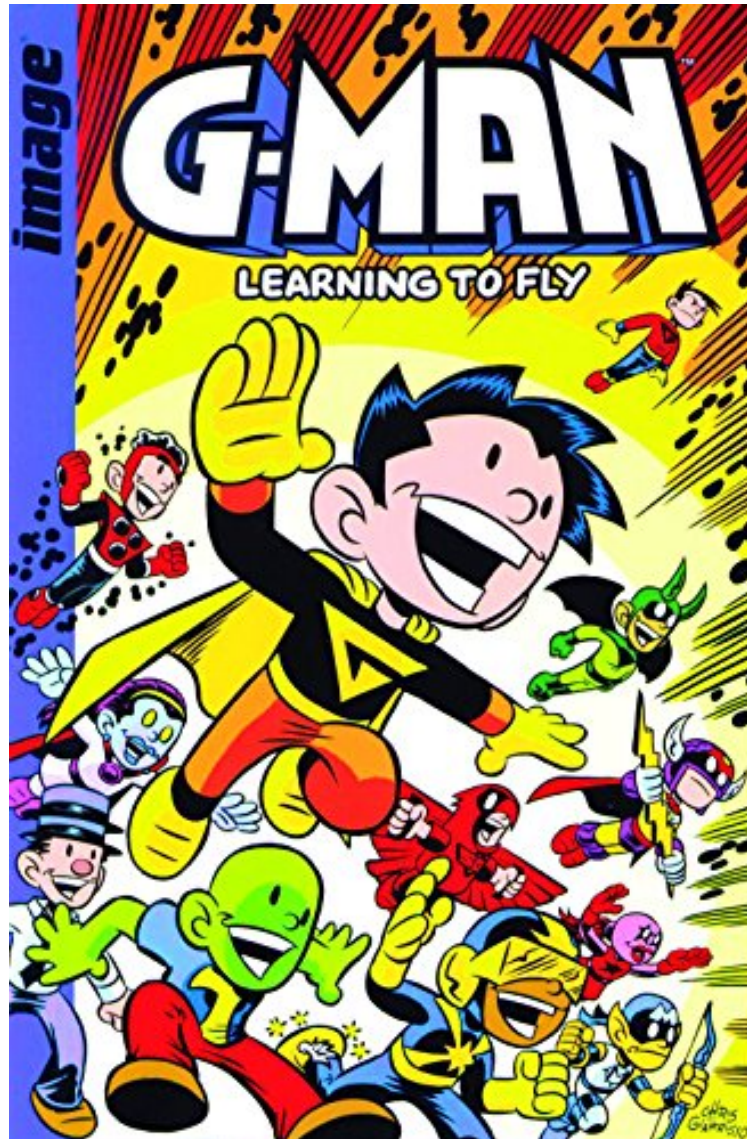

It was a great all-ages work that did a great job of lampooning the marvel tropes and events of the day. This book of G-Man is a much older set of work, predating Mini Marvels by 5 years or so, and it shows. Many of the rhythms and forms that work to such great effect

in Mini Marvels are here to be seen, yet it is still rough. The story is less focused, the punchlines have less oomph. Though still a enjoyable all-ages read that I would definitely recommend for children, it is definitely a work in progress. G-Man joins his superhero friends Billy Demon, Tan Man, Suntrooper, and the Spark on their very first superhero adventure. But what are they to do when their enemy is Kid Thunder, son of the city's greatest champion, Captain Thunderman? And will G-Man's big brother, Great Man, prove to be friend or foe?

From Booklist With the obvious appeal of young superpowered boys to real young boys, you might think the ranks of graphic novels would be spilling over with them. Well, the pickings have been pretty slim, actually, though the arrival of G-Man somewhat makes up for that oversight. G-Man is a decent little guy whose wont-quit attitude and clever commandeering of the familys magic blanket brings him and his friends into contention with a mean older brother and finally Kid Thunder, bully of the sky. With no higher aspirations than a rousing bit of fun and can-do kid adventure, G-Man hits all the right notes, from its friendly cartoon figures to the occasionally hilarious one-liners. Even the much shorter adventures and single-page gags that fill more than half the book will divert the attention of daydreaming boys. Put it alongside Scott Christian Savas Hyperactive (2008), Marvels recent Franklin Richards comics, and Jake Bells Amazing Adventures of Nate Banks series (which Giarrusso illustrated), and youve more or less cornered the male pretween superhero market.
