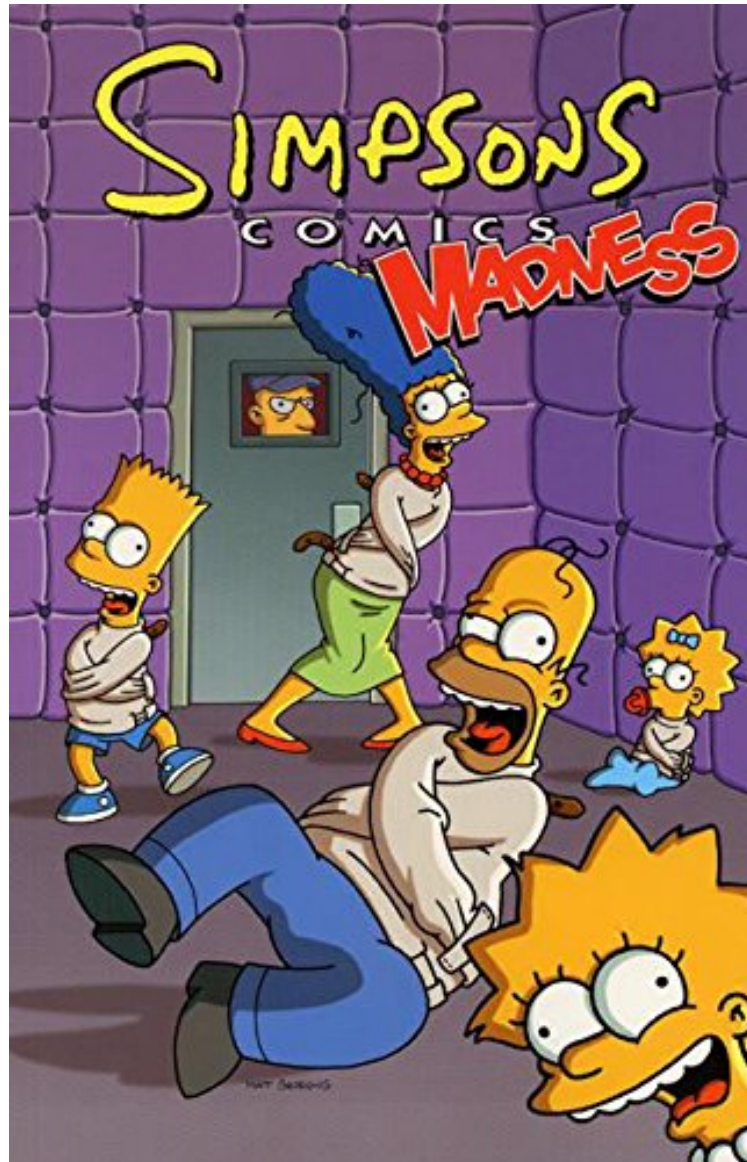

of fairly unique stories in this one, and all are good reads. The only one that I thought was a bit mediocre is Hamburger's Little Helper which was not quite as interesting as the other stories, it wasn't terrible but just paled in comparison. The first of my favorites is Journey To The Center Of The Kwik-E-Mart! It's the first one in the book and it starts off strong, by showing us a picture with the Simpsons family and friends staring at the aftermath of a wild adventure. I won't spoil what that is though it's too good although you could probably guess by the title, it reads in a very distinct way which can be slightly irritating at first but you'll get used to it. I love the character dynamics in this one, the way Bart, Lisa, Milhouse and Martin interact with each other is very funny and combined with the setting makes for a very entertaining read. One thing I didn't like though was that they didn't have to go all the way with the reading style they chose. What happens to Lisa is also slightly disturbing, something about a naked 8 year old girl surrounded by three horny boys seems not right, but maybe I'm reading too much into it. Anyways great story, it gets an A-. My second favorite is The Prime of Miss Lisa Simpson, a very interesting little situation comedy where Lisa and Martin are made the interim teachers of their respective classes after Bart gets most of the faculty deported (nothing much comes from this though). Without giving away more than I already have, this one is good mostly for being a Lisa-centric story which is good considering she doesn't get much attention in most Simpsons comics. Good story and decent jokes make this one a B-. The last story I'm going to mention is my personal favorite of the bunch which is The Rise and Fall of Bartholomew J. Simpson, the reason this one is the best without giving too much away is because it's set in the future a classic Simpsons tactic that I've always really loved. Basically something happens to Bart in the future a mystery comes out of it and it's up to Lisa to figure it out, you know basic stuff but well done. The gags that come out of seeing what happens to certain characters in the future though is what makes this one so memorable, in particular the one with Maggie which is so damn good that I wouldn't dare to spoil it! Let's just say that I hope the decision is made to make this canon, although this is extremely unlikely, as a huge Maggie fan I certainly hope so! Anyways this is a very good one, and I'm sure most people will enjoy it as much as I did, Overall an A+. In conclusion, buy this book! Seeing the cool cover artwork for this comic book (the Simpsons in straight jackets) I had high expectations for this book. At first, I thought I was going to be completely disappointed. The first comics are not very funny and almost as silly as the "Big Book of Bart" books. The first comic, "Journey to the Cellar of the Kwik-E-Mart" is annoying. It starts with a strange photo featuring such things as Lisa wearing a Squishzilla cup and a guy in a chicken outfit tied to the hood of a car and then takes the reader back in certain increments of time to explain the ending. I kept forgetting what the comic was about while reading it. The ending to "Tic Tac D'oh" is farfetched even by Simpsons' standards. In "The Prime of Miss Lisa Simpson," Bart has the teachers deported and the top students have to take over their classes (this one has some pretty funny moments). In "Hamburger's Little Helper," the Simpson dog gains stardom after biting Krusty the Clown in the butt. Sideshow Bob is released from prison only to start a crime school in "Angels with Yellow Faces." The true gem, however, is "The Rise and Fall of Bartholomew J. Simpson." If you enjoyed the episode "Lisa's Wedding" where Lisa gets a glimpse of her future, this comic is for you. Lisa visits Bart in the hospital and hears him utter two words. She then researches the past to find out what they mean and why an anonymous person donated a digestive tract to her ailing brother. This comic is hilarious and you will never guess who Maggie ended up marrying!! Another fun addition is John's (the gay guy in "Homer's Phobia") Cockamamies Collectible catalog which includes references to many past Simpsons episodes. The shorts feature Bartman, Poochie, and Mr. Sparkle (the latter being as odd as the character). The look at the Simpsons' future makes this comic book worthwhile.
