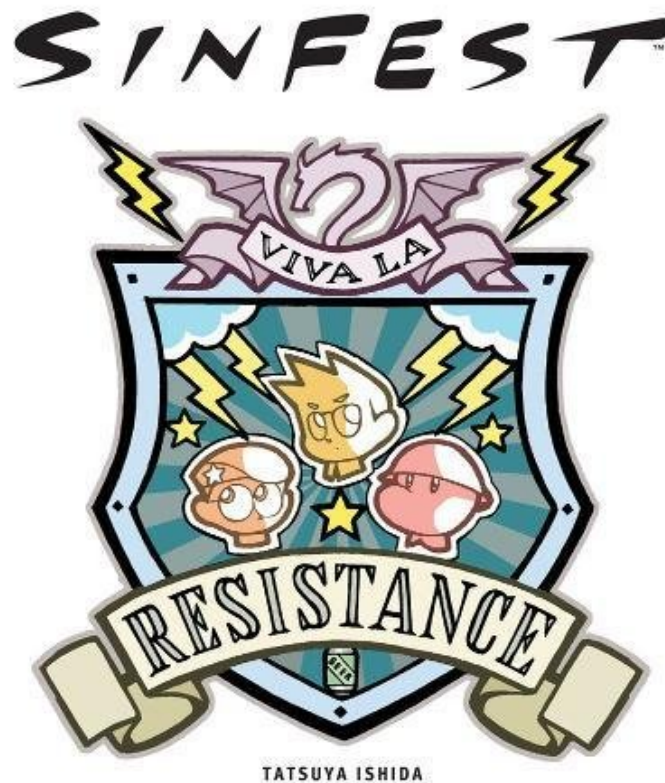

Since it started, Sinfest captured attention of many with its wit and humor. This is one of longest going web comics and I must admit that I enjoy reading it quite often. Characters are interesting (although after so many years it would be nice to shuffle things a bit as stereotypes can go only so far), story is developing (slowly, but...) and although it is increasingly difficult to keep adding new, fresh ideas into something running this long Mr. Ishida is doing a good job. I must admit that, although newer comics are much more polished technically speaking, I find myself going back to the roots and admiring that witty humor and not-so-hidden poking at political/religious/sexual/other issues. Mr. Ishida's ability to identify and make fun of issues that we humans find essential and/or intriguing is "non plus ultra". Somebody might get offended with some of the strips but hey, you can't please everybody. I know for sure that I will always be going back to Sinfest and my goal is to have them all safely stored somewhere so my kid can read it and enjoy Mr. Ishida's work too. It's worth having, make no mistake. On a side note, do pay attention to Mr. Ishida's signature phrase in top right corner as well as many changing little details in the comic. You will find it highly amusing :)
