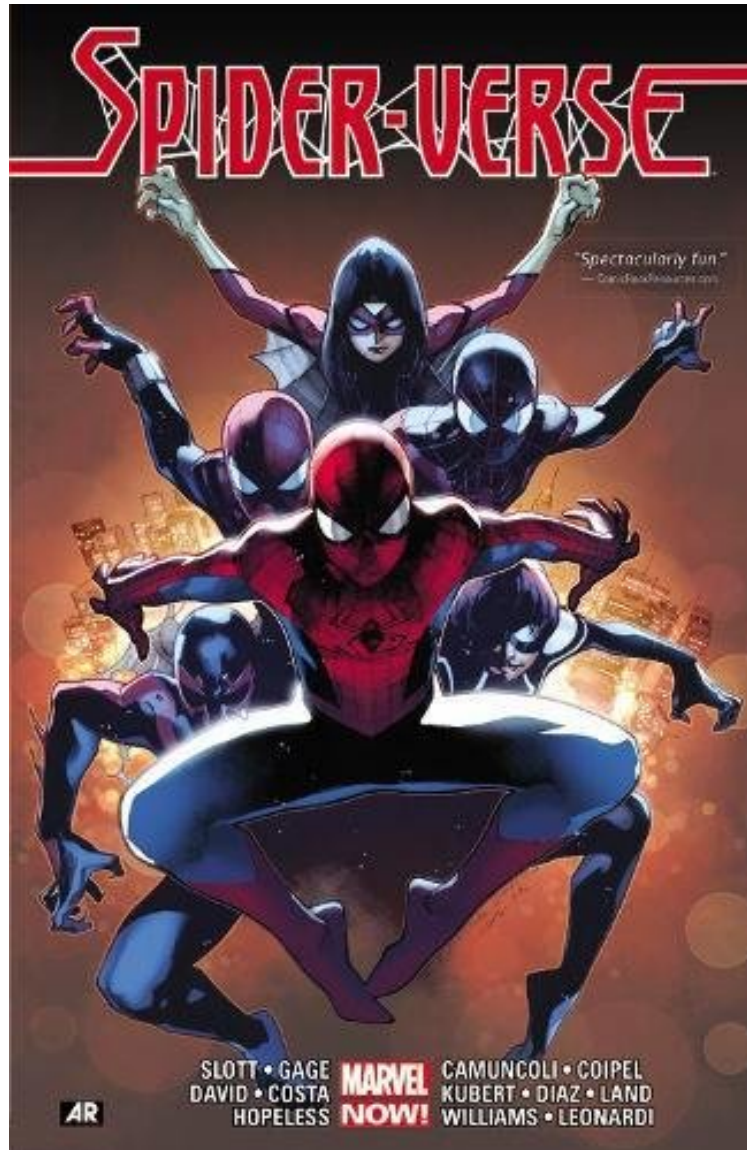

It is a fun, wide-ranging, no-holds barred, cosmic spider-man story. I don't normally read Spider-Man, but this event has me reconsidering that. The binding, likewise is great. It's solid, it's sturdy, it's beautiful. The pages are printed slightly larger than standard comic book size, so you can experience the art at its

best. But the collection itself is lacking in a few places. The Amazing Spider-Man issues that cross-over with Edge of Spider-Verse are not included (although Edge of Spider-Verse itself is included, as it says in the description). So the true completionist will want the collection of those: <http://www.marvel.com/Amazing-Spider-Man-Spider-Verse-Marvel-Comics/dp/0785197281/> Also, Spider-Verse issue two contains a story written entirely in Spanish ("El Espritu de las Calles"). The art is great, but I unfortunately took French in high school, and understood none of the words. At the end, it says "Download the free digital version for the story in English". Alas, no such download is to be found online, and it appears that the original comic came with a one-time code that you could use in some Marvel app. I have not found the code in this edition. However, the most egregious thing is that the stories are not printed in reading order. A reading order is outlined at the front of the book, but the stories are grouped by title (e.g. all the "Superior Spider-Man" issues, then all the "Amazing Spider-Man" issues, etc.). So if you read the stories in the order printed, the main storyline will conclude in the first half of the book, and then all the details will be filled in in the second half. Lacking page numbers or a table of contents, it is difficult to skip around. I went through my copy with post-it flags and marked a better reading order on them. In conclusion, this is still a great collection, but with a little work it could have been amazing.

Up there with the best of Slott's Spider-Man run. He makes it look easy presenting a compelling high-concept (all the Spider-Men you've ever seen teaming-up!) that builds off several years of his own run, meaningfully ties-in all the other Spider-Family ongoing titles, and homages to some of the great Spider chapters of yester-year (in this case, "The Other" from JMS's run in the 2000's). Coipel carries the art as always but Camuncoli keeps up with him better than I expected. Lots of fun bonus material, too. I didn't mind the non-chronological order because the truth is, if you read it straight through from the front, you get a well-paced narrative followed by what can be summarized as bonus material. If it were chronological it would be a jumbled mess with a repetitive and meandering prologue followed by an unevenly paced and perpetually interrupted main story. I highly recommend the five-issue Edge of Spider-Verse featuring Spider-Gwen and others to complete this collection.

I'm not a much of a fan of big Marvel cross-overs in general, but I was interested in this due to liking some of the books that follow it. I'm about half way through and it's a bit spotty and hard to follow plot-wise, but I won't go into that much. The biggest problem is the issues aren't in chronological order. Instead, they're grouped together by series. So you can either read them out of order or keep flipping to the chronological listing in the front to see which issue to read next. It's just poorly done and there is no real good reason why they just didn't place them in order in the first place. The Spider-Verse event is kind of a mess anyway and having a sloppy collection doesn't help. Even if you like the plot, it'd be hard to say that this collection was well thought out.
