The Street Fighter III EraBy David SwanGiven that the subtitle of the book is New Generation which is also the subtitle of the first Street Fighter III game and the villain is Gill, readers would have to assume that this story takes place in the events of Street Fighter III: New Generation. New Generation was the first of three SF III games that also included 2nd Impact and 3rd Strike. SF III features the last events in the current Street Fighter timeline. At this point the chronology goes Street Fighter - Street Fighter Alpha - Street Fighter II - Street Fighter IV - Street Fighter V and finally Street Fighter III. Capcom chose to slip IV and V in between II and III. One of the distinctive features of the SF III games is that Capcom eschewed nearly all the established characters besides Ken and Ryu. It wasnt until 3rd Strike that Chun Li was added. For whatever reason this book chooses to focus on a different roster than the game roster.The main character in SF III is Alex and he does have a prominent roll but Guile actually has more page time despite not appearing in SF III. I can understand why Udon would want more focus to established characters like Chun Li and E. Honda but Hakan and Juri? Those characters are from SF IV. The only New Generation character with a significant presence is Alex and hes a very dull character. Why not give time to Ibuki or Necro or Oro? Sean, Yun and Yang only get very brief appearance.I absolutely loved the Street Fighter Classic volumes but that series had a much tighter storyline. Im not saying it didnt meander but with three volumes and over 300 pages per volume it had the luxury to wandering a bit. Super Street Fighter: New Generation only has two volumes at less than 150 pages per volume and really needed to work on its focus. Its cool that we get a fight between Dudley and Balrog but it did nothing to advance the storyline. Likewise with the Hakan/E. Honda fight. There is an appearance by Twelve from SF III 3rd Impact which also has no relevance to the plot. The segment with Ibuki seemed particularly pointless.The art is almost universally awesome with the one weak section being the Ibuki story. When you take into account the 43 pages of sketches and bonus art there is actually only about 100 pages of story. One of the main reasons I buy these books is for the art and I would buy a book which consisted solely of Udon art. I wish the storyline could have been tighter but its still a great looking book. I look forward to volume 2 and I hope it sticks better to the main storyline and well get more focus on the New Generation character. In the end I really enjoyed this book. Its not to the quality of Street Fighter Classic but still quite good.6 of 6 people found the following review helpful. So so offering, but worthwhile to get if you're a fanBy 1AnimeFanSPOILERSI am a fan of the Street Fighter series, and have purchased the 3 prior Ultimate editions produced by UDON.The events of this series occur after the Street Fighter II series; comparing the booko to the video games, this would be Street Fighter III.As 's descriptions states, with Shadaloo having been defeated in the Street Fighter II comic series, the world has been relatively at ease. However, behind the scenes a new villainous society has formed to threaten the world, the Secret Society. The Secret Society is targeting street fighters around the world for purposes unknown, and Guile means to find out why.Frankly, not much happened in this volume. There were a couple of short fights, but it really felt like a reintroduction to what the returning characters have been up to and an introduction to some new characters. The book has a list price of \$35 for 144 pages, and at least 20 pages of that is character sketches and artwork.I'd give this volume 2.5 to 3 stars. Not my favorite volume.
