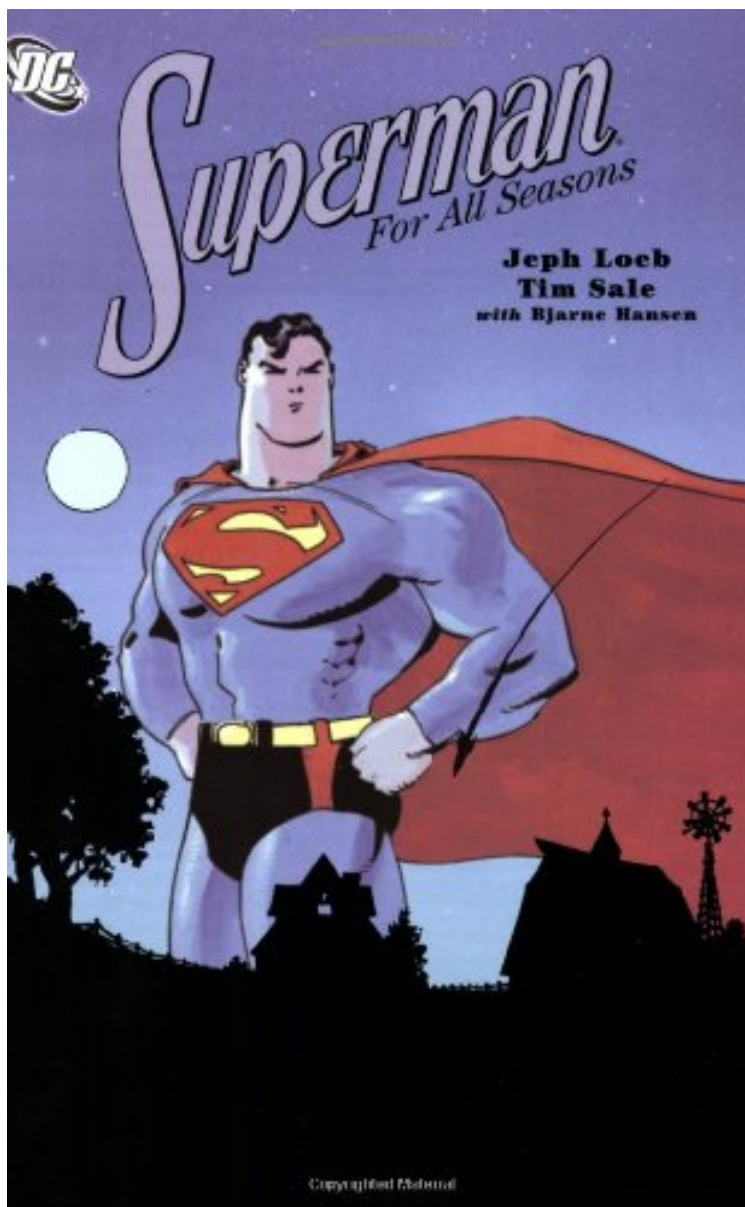

had never before sat down and read one myself until I read *Superman For All Seasons*. However, I think I chose the perfect starting point to get into the *Man Of Steel* because this story is just amazing. Jeph Loeb's writing and Tim Sale's art combined with Bjarne Hanen's coloring work combine to make this book something so so SO special and so different from what you'd expect from a Superman story, or from your average comic book, for that matter. There's a wonderful charm about this book in every page, in the writing and the structure of the story as it is told from the point of view of different key characters in Superman's life, each during a different season of the year at different stages in Superman's life. This book made me feel good inside as I was reading about this character that, despite being essentially an alien god, is really just a son, a friend, a neighbor; and really just a good dude with a heart of gold and a strong desire to do what's right. The art in this book is so beautiful that even my 62 year old mother, who knows nothing about comics, couldn't stop flipping through its pages. If you're one of those people who finds Superman boring and complains about him being way too powerful and too difficult to relate to (like I was!), just do yourself a favor and read this book. By the end it might prove to you that Superman may indeed be the most human of all superheroes out there.

Timeless Classic By Alex Lamberd For the most part, one would think that a Superman story would contain mostly a variety of action sequences that help to mildly distract its audience. I was under that impression before I started reading some well written Superman stories, and in my travels I came across *For All Seasons*, and might I say, this has become one of the (if not the) best Superman stories I have ever read. From the way the art is meticulously handled, to the narrative itself, *For All Seasons* is a coming of age story that all people, even those who are not fans of the *Man of Steel*, should sit down and read at least once in their lives. I'd like to go on record that I was originally not a big fan of Tim Sale's art; actually, I rather hated it and only really bothered to go through it because people recommended work he was involved with to me. Having said that, after reading this and some of his other collaborations with Jeff Loeb, I have come to admire the work Sale does in his novels. The book starts off with a dedication from Sale to Norman Rockwell, and the book is very evident that Rockwell was a source of inspiration for this. The first part contains some of my favorite pages from any comic I ever read and feels like such a nice slice of Americana that I would mind hanging some of the art on my wall. I'm not too big on the way he draws Superman, but it works for the work he is doing. I would say that people new to Sale's art might be thrown off from it at first, but if that's the case, give it some time. Once you get used to it you start to see how his art really works within the narrative, and then you begin to really admire it. As for the narrative itself, I can't help but feel like they should have gotten more inspiration from this novel for the recent *Man of Steel* movie (2013). This novel had many emotional moments that I enjoyed (and harkened back to episodes of *Smallville*) and really gave a nice view of Superman that we don't normally see. I won't spoil the story, but I will say that this was one of the stories that really helped me appreciate the kind of character Superman is and I hope I see similar stories of the *Man of Steel* in the future. Overall, I am very satisfied with the graphic novel and wholeheartedly recommend it to everyone. (My only gripe is that they should have a new version out by now with the new DC logo on it, but that is more of preference than actual complaint) I hope others are able to enjoy this as much as I did.

That sounds like the ultimate heresy for any comic fan, but he never really drew my attention the way that Batman did (I have an extensive Batman collection). But when I saw that this particular story was written by Jeph Loeb with art by Tim Sale, I knew I couldn't pass this up; these guys had delivered big time with *Batman: The Long Halloween* and *Batman: Dark Victory*! What I found with this book was a delightful series of stories largely pertaining to Clark Kent growing up around *Smallville* before moving to *Metropolis* where he dons the Superman persona. It's a story about Superman's roots, about the lessons and values his parents instilled in him and how it influences his actions as Superman. It's a story about rising above the doubters (in this case Lex Luthor) to become something so much greater than you could ever imagine. Loeb's writing is believable and really captures the spirit of every individual character, and of course Tim Sale's art is nothing short of amazing! I feel safe in saying that this book had made me a regular Superman fan; it has a magic to it that I rarely encounter when it comes to heroes of his caliber. Whether you're a longtime fan of the hero or you're looking for somewhere to start, this book is a great addition to any comic fan's collection.
