The story was so so, can't say I knew anything about the Super Patriot at all before getting this. That was probably the reason I was so meh about this. I liked all the visuals and dialog between the characters but I didn't feel any presence of "MUST READ" spinning about in my head. By Kid Kyoto Superpatriot is an interesting character, the short form would be Captain America but with arms that turn into guns but over the years he's grown into much more than he started out as. Erik Larson created him in the 90s as a character in his Savage Dragon series. An over-the-hill WWII hero Superpatriot is soon crippled and left for dead by modern villains. But he is rebuilt by an evil corporation and turned into a state-of-the-art killer cyborg. Two miniseries in the 90s by Keith Giffen and Dave Johnson fleshed him out and introduced his two illegitimate children Liberty and Justice. While one has been collected (and is now out of print) the first series was never reprinted which is a real shame. This book builds on the character and give it a new spin. Superpatriot is stuck in a rut, reading the paper, playing poker with his old buddies, teaming up with his kids, killing Nazis, same old, old. But the return of Hitler (now in a robot gorilla body) might just bring an end to his career. This book is light on plot but long on style and fun. While artist Cory Walker is not quite as good as Dave Johnson (but then again who is?) he comes really close, giving us cool designs, epic battles with cyber Nazis. Writer Robert Kirkman manages to balance the standard comic battle and still give us characters who come to life thanks to small details and throw-away dialogue. It has some faults, Walker sometimes reuses panels making only a small change in a character's pose. There are a couple of flashbacks that are more concerned with parodying old comics than advancing the plot and in all the story is pretty thin. But it's a fun fast read and very entertaining.
