builds off the first. John's solid run on Teen Titans comes before Infinite Crisis and here sees the return of iconic member Raven who has been reborn as a vessel for the Cult of Brother Blood. A new claimant to that title, a vicious teenager named Sebastian, hopes to wed Raven against her will and with her give birth to a host for Trigon: Raven's demonic father. The new Titans set out to find and save Raven from Brother Blood and his cultists though the team is split down the middle on how to handle her. The classic team members like Starfire, Beast Boy, and Cyborg desperately want to be reunited with their friend, but the new guard of Kid Flash, Robin, Wonder Girl, and Superboy don't trust that Raven can keep her demonic nature in check. Added to the team's problems is the return of Slade Wilson. Deathstroke spent the previous volume being controlled by his body-swapping son Jericho and while under his son's influence, Slade was forced to kill his old friend Wintergreen. Seeking revenge on his own child, Slade conscripts his estranged daughter Rose and trains her to be the new Ravager. The book is a great continuation of John's work, though Sebastian Blood is more of a creepy villain than an outright threatening one. The title does lose a bit of steam early on when Johns has to briefly summarize the Titans' long history with Raven since it is pertinent information. The best moments continue to be the wonderful character beats between the team members as well as between Slade and his daughter. I also enjoyed the Easter Egg swipe at "Wade Wilson." A character shows up in the book with that name claiming to be an estranged brother's of Slade though he is quickly killed off and is an obvious stand-in for the Rob Liefeld created knockoff of Slade: Marvel's glorious merc with the mouth Deadpool.0 of 0 people found the following review helpful. Fabricated ConflictBy Grim KnightWell let me start by saying this feels like Teen Titans but with a slightly different, less cooler history than the one Marv Wolfman established. For example Starfire states that her family gave her up when the Citadel invaded Tameran and that her brother and sister stood by. What actually happened is that Blackfire (the sister) invaded Tameran and her Wildfire (brother) was a little toddler who was begging his parents to save Starfire. Also throughout the comic there are several instances where the conflict felt forced (like Slade and Rose trying to kill Raven).
