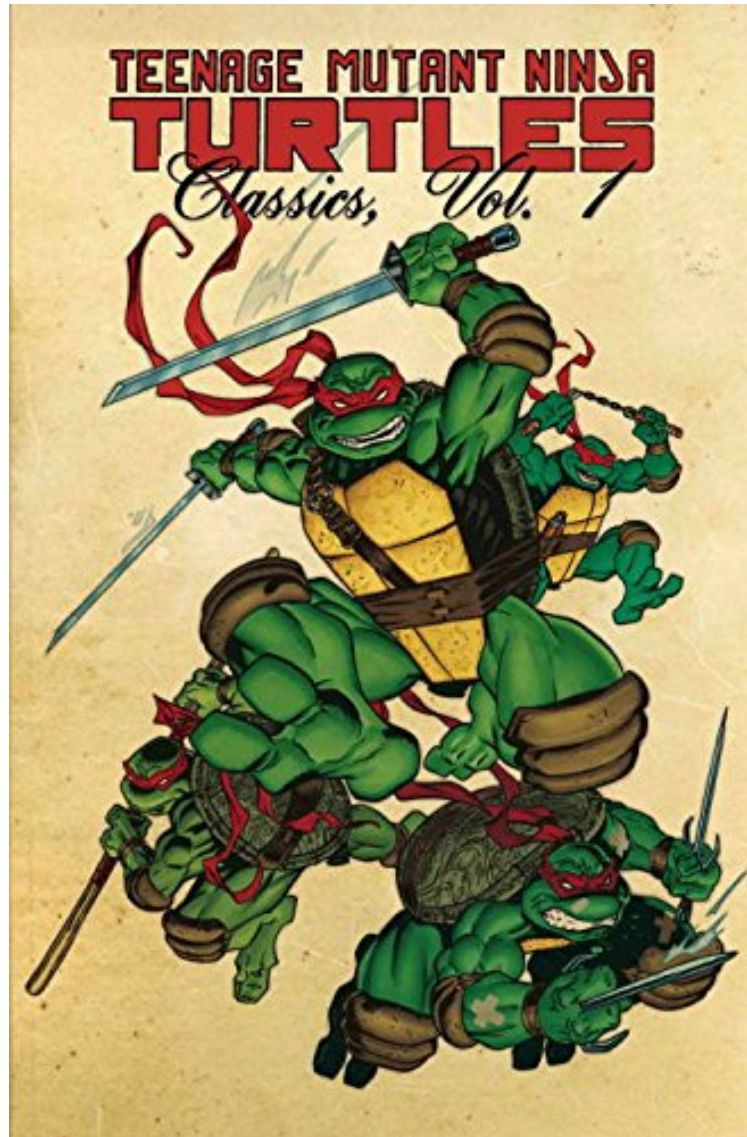

I, like many others, got into the comics after becoming hooked on the Saturday morning cartoon beginning in the late '80s. By the early '90s, I had begun to collect some of the Mirage Studios volume one comics. I only ever got a few issues though, and was excited to see they have reprinted many. My friend's dad growing up is Mark Martin, and I never had any of his issues, so I was really excited to see he'd be in here. In addition, Mark Bode was advertised as being in here as well, which is not the case. (Shell of the Dragon is an amazing issue done with Kevin Eastman.) That's right: TWO OF THE THREE MIRAGE VOLUME ONE BOOKS ARE NOT INCLUDED as advertised. So, thanks to either IDW, or . I should have just clicked "buy" on ebay a few months back, but since these would all be in a cheaper new print, I thought I'd save some money and have them all together. Anyways, here are the contents included in this book, which now has a cover by Michael Dooney (not as cool as the advertised Mark Martin cover): Issue #13: The People's Choice The rest are short stories used as back-up stories with regular issues or collections: Bottoming Out Junkman New York Ninja Word Warriors 49th Street Stompers O-Deed Road Trip Don't Judge a Book A Splinter in the Eye of God? Night Life Meanwhile... 1,000,000 B.C. These are fine, but I have been looking forward to owning issues #1-21 (this book fills in the gaps found in TMNT Ultimate Collection Vol. #1-3). Had I known the contents would change, I would have looked into other options for Eastman and Laird's #13, 16, and 18. Also, the book arrived with a dent near the spine. By DeRosset Myers To be blatantly honest at the risk of upsetting a few hipster fans, I prefer the ones in color, partly because those are the ones I saw first, and mostly because it means red blood. There are parts of this comic that are pretty bloody, as well as some graphic "piercing" if you know what I mean. It's not kid-friendly and it's hard for me to tell how it got turned into a children's cartoon series, albeit very loosely-based. I don't remember exactly how much I paid for this and the price might have gone up or down since then, but I did get my money's worth. The only reason I'm rating it four stars instead of five is because it doesn't grab me like 5s do. It's still pretty good though if you're into dark premises and a Japanese sense of honor and revenge ... in New York ... with anthropomorphic turtles and a sensei rat who's also pretty much their adoptive father. If you're looking for April, she's in the next issue; this is pretty much just an origin story that may or may not have any connection to the Daredevil comics. The color format is a double-edged sword if you also like to read comics and graphic novels on black-and-white display devices like Paperwhite and older Kindles since the contrast is lower, making it harder to make out what's going on than the original BW formats, but that's more of a problem in later issues, and if you don't read these on a black and white display, you got nothing to worry about ... except brightness glare, but I'm not reviewing e-readers right now.
